Non-Revolution youth joining in activities	N.A	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In public spaces, non-Revolution Youth will be entitled to be wherever they like in the park. As a youth team, we need to be prepared to respond appropriately to both children and adults who may choose to be near us or where we are taking part in activities. This includes non-confrontationally explaining to adults that this is a youth event. 	N.A
Youth walking off or leaving the session early	2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All parents will be informed when signing up for trips that if their child chooses to leave, we will not follow. They will be asked not to send their young person on the trip if they think there is a risk of this, or if they are unhappy with their child making their own way home if they choose. Youth will be reminded to stay with us until the end of the session. If a young person does this without permission, they will not be permitted to future sessions. 	2
Injuries caused by falls, activities, etc.	3	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> A first aid kit will be brought to site, or it will be established that one is already on site. First-aiders will be on site. In the case of a serious injury, an ambulance will be called, as well as parents. All activities will be supervised by leaders. 	2
Threat from outside people (youth, adults)	3	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In public spaces, we cannot require anyone else to leave. However if anyone from our group is threatened, we can call the police and leave the area as necessary. Youth leaders will aim to de-escalate any threatening situation. 	2

Injuries caused by cars or transport.	3	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Youth leaders will be spaced out throughout the group whenever we walk as a group. Youth leaders will be at the front and back of the group, and will supervise all road crossings. 	2
Dehydration	2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Drinks will be brought by youth team and a break will be taken halfway through so that young people can have something to drink. 	1
Danger from tram or similar transport	4	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Young people will be supervised and only permitted on tram carriages with youth leaders. Youth leaders will be spread up and down the tram, with young people in sight at all times. Young people will be briefed before each journey, including about any tram changes and what to do at platforms. Leaders will keep watch on the tram platforms for safety of young people, ensuring they are not too close to the edge. Any young person displaying unsafe behaviour will be asked to leave the session. Leaders will check trams when leaving to ensure all young people are gathered together. One youth leader will retain all tickets for all young people. 	2
Inappropriate behaviour at sessions could lead to danger.	3	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Youth will be reminded to follow all instructions given by the centre/instructors with whom we are visiting. Youth who are behaving inappropriately will be asked to sit out of the session for a short time, or in repeated/extreme cases, removed from the session entirely. Leaders will work with and support instructors and follow centre rules at all times, ensuring young people do likewise. 	1
Other risks	N.A	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Our usual procedures and policies will be followed as far as is suitable to keep young people safe. Dynamic risk assessments will be carried out by youth leaders, and youth leaders will be aware that they can and should raise any issue of risk with the Session Leader at any point. 	N.A
